
In the 1500s, before Europeans settled what is now the United States, a group of Indian nations lived in the hills and valleys along the Hudson River.






































He gave a powerful speech, urging the nations to forma peaceful league- a union.

We have a common interest and must determine how this can be done.


To oppose other tribes, singly and alone, would prove destruction. We must unite into one common band of brothers.



































































You five great and powerful nations must unite and no foe shall disturb you. We desire the alliance and friendship of all. And if we unite in one band, the Great Spirit will smile on us.












Hiawatha's speech convinced the tribes to put aside their differences. Leaders of the Five Nations formed a new government and called it the Iroquois League.


